Natalie has been able to hone her skills and take on more responsibilities over time.





My name is Amber and I'm a George Mason MSW student intern working with Porto Charities. My role is to provide employment support for young adults with intellectual/developmental disabilities. We are following the Marc Gold & Associates Customized Employment model to develop customized roles for each job seeker. Customized employment is a person-centered model that curates opportunities based on the unique strengths of each individual. We provide follow up support to ensure every job seeker successfully integrates into their role.

I am conducting discovery with my job seeker, Tyler, in order to learn what contributions he can bring to potential employers. I've been getting to know Tyler by observing him work and volunteer in a variety of settings. He has comprehensive skills and interests that make him a great candidate for a working in a support capacity to a car sales associate. In addition, Tyler has intrapersonal skills that would make him a good leader as a sports coach. Lastly, we are considering a role that capitalizes on his technology skills.
